Mission Statement

The Aleph Institute is a not-for profit Jewish religious, educational, humanitarian organization, serving the Jewish community. We offer a multitude of services to Jewish men and women confined and their families focused on the premise that "no Jew is forgotten" and that "no Jew is alone."

About The Aleph Institute

The Aleph Institute, a not-for-profit 501 (c) (3) religious organization, stands alone as the foremost agency in the world today, serving the spiritual needs of incarcerated Jews and their families.

A not-for-profit Jewish religious organization, Aleph provides welcome relief for Jews who have been virtually forgotten by traditional American Jewish organizations. Aleph's mission is a generally thankless one. The Institute often struggles against challenging odds to create, organize and facilitate a wealth of programs. These programs spread the wellsprings of Jewish wisdom, knowledge and understanding to all who request it, regardless of who they are or their ability to pay. Aleph has also undertaken to raising funds for these significant programs, on an ongoing basis.

In 1981, at the express direction of the Lubavticher Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem M. Schneerson, of sainted and blessed memory, Rabbi Sholom Ber Lipskar set out to support a segment of the Jewish population that, for years, had suffered from gross neglect. He began Aleph as a one-man operation based in Miami, Florida. In 1991 The North East regional office opened. Today, Aleph has evolved into the nation's most trusted and

effective advocate for prisoners and their loved ones. Its programs have been implemented in dozens of regional, state and federal correctional facilities, and its staff and personnel have gained the endorsement of a skeptical prison system. In fact, America's prison officials recognize the Aleph Institute's educational and humanitarian programs. What's more, they have accorded the organization, and those who work for it, a unique level of confidence and responsibility.

The programs and services of Aleph are designed to attain maximum impact within the prison environment. These efforts have also served as the basis for programs that reach out to the prison-affiliated population. The success of Aleph's programs attests to the power of its Torah-based approach to serving prisoners, their families and humanity in general.

He was born in Manchester, England to Rabbi and Mrs. Yechiel Vogel of blessed memory, and received his formal education in the Jewish day schools in Manchester and then in London.

Rabbi Vogel has always lived within the Chabad - Lubavitch framework. His mentor and Rabbi

is the Lubavticher Rebbe, of sainted memory. Rabbi Vogel's extensive education assumed an international flavor. After early instruction in Great Britain, he studied at the Lubavitch Yeshiva "Toras Emes" in Jerusalem, Israel and the Central Lubavitch Academy "Tomchei Temimim," in New York, where he received his ordination.

In 1984, soon after receiving his Rabbinical Ordination, he spent the high holidays leading services in the Federal Prison Camp in Allenwood, Pennsylvania. Thus began a career of working with Jewish men and women incarcerated in the federal, state and local prisons.

In 1991, he settled in Pittsburgh, PA, opening the "Aleph Institute – North East Region," and has worked with federal, state and county officials, in

providing for the religious needs of the Jewish men and women incarcerated and humanitarian needs of the inmates' families.

The Rabbi has been called upon to testify before the Pennsylvania state judiciary committee as a prison expert, has worked with Pennsylvania Senator Specter's office in the writing of Federal law affecting Jewish inmates, and has worked and continues to work with federal, state and local officials daily, on many issues.

He lives with his wife, sons, and daughters in Pittsburgh.
